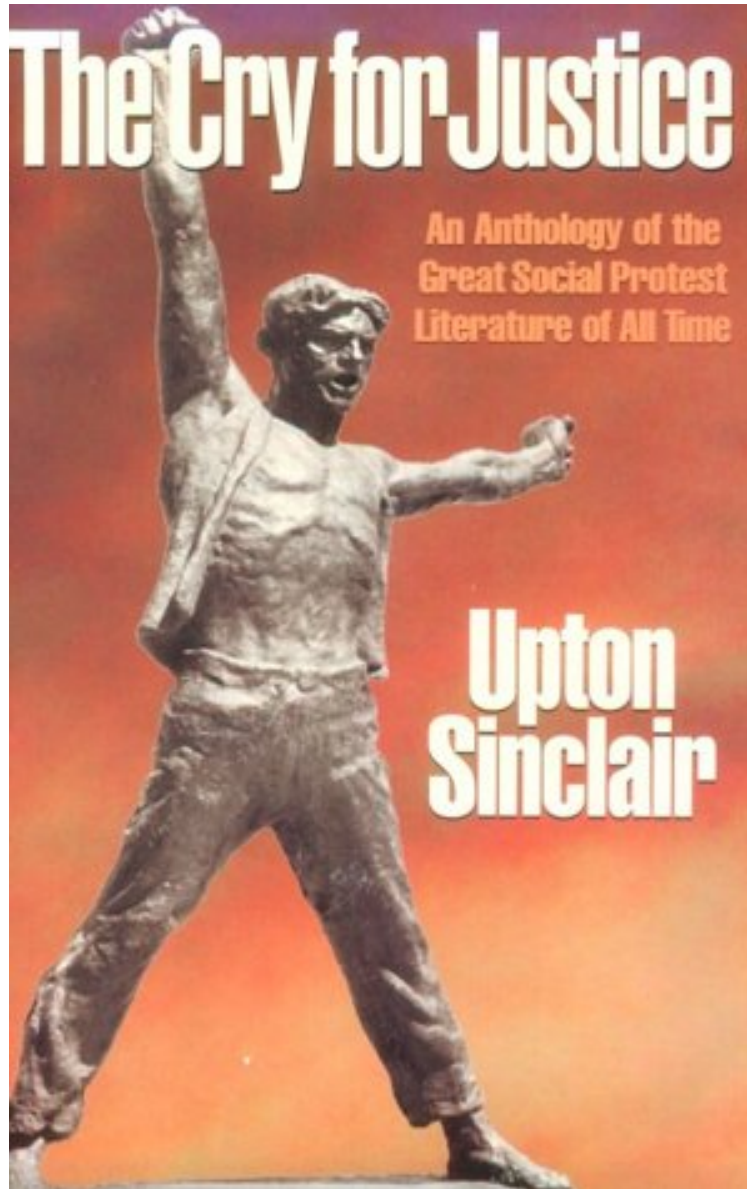

copy. By Andrew Morris The book's description on opens with "This historic book may have numerous typos and missing text." That doesn't begin to cover the flaws of this edition. This "edition" (if you can call it an edition when the publisher explicitly states that it can't be bothered to edit) is appallingly bad. The text is a poor text-recognition scan, riddled with misreads, mis-scans and odd nonsense fragments. There is no table of contents, and the index is useless, as it refers to the original print edition's pagination. The text itself--tiny and in three columns--is virtually unreadable by any reasonable standard. At the start of the text is a whining justification for this edition's worthlessness: "Our books sell so few copies that you would have to pay hundreds of dollars to cover the cost of proofreading..."
